

# GERMAN MADE ESCAPE

FROM MILITARY HOSPITAL BUT  
WAS RECAPTURED.

He Was Rounded Up By the Hospital  
Chief—The Hun Dropped From  
a Window.

Jumping out of the second-storey window of the military hospital on Queen street, about 9 o'clock on Thursday night, a German prisoner named Brubacher, who has been undergoing treatment for indigestion made a get-away, but his liberty only lasted an hour, for he was rounded up by the chief of the hospital W. Mitchell.

Mitchell lives on Pine street, and while sitting on his door step he was very much surprised to see the German prisoner walk by his house. He immediately nabbed him. The German is six feet tall, and weighs 160 pounds. Mitchell is short, and of light build. Immediately there was a tussle but Mitchell stuck to his man and although the German tried hard to get away, he did not succeed. Mitchell then started off for the station hospital. On the way, the German again tried to pay "high jinks" with Mitchell, but the latter succeeded in handling him all right, and walked him back to the hospital without assistance.

As soon as the escape of the German was reported, all the members of the city and military police force, were asked to be on the look out for him, and they were busy searching the city when word was received that the German had been rounded up. The Hun did not suffer very much as a result of his drop from the hospital window.

The escaped prisoner left two letters upon his desk, one of which was addressed to Lieut. S. J. Keyes, in which he thanked him and the hospital staff for the care and attention he had received. He also stated that, in spite of it all, he was going to take "French leave," but he hoped to meet them again after the war.
