Interned In Fison Camps Ottawa, Sept. 10.—Over two bindred interned allens have been released by General Sir William Otter, but there is gill a gradual increase

in the total number in the interpment camps, now about 7,000, due chiefly to the gathering in of men who broke their parole. A few of the men who have been released were Serbians and Roumanians, who were interned by mistake. Others were Austrians whose friends were able to guarantee them steady employment. General Otter's policy is to release any who keep down the expenses of his camps. There are Germans in only three working camps, Nanalmo, Vernon and Amherst, The rest are confined in larracks at dif-ferent points. General Otter, who has just returned from the West, states that there will be plenty of work in the Rocky Mountain parks for his prisoners of war this winter.

About 7,000
