

FAIR DEAL FOR FOREIGNER, SUBJECT OF ADDRESS AT THE "FORUM" LAST NIGHT

The speaker at the People's Forum last night was Mr. J. S. Woodsworth, secretary of the Canadian Welfare League and president of the People's Forum committee at Winnipeg. There was a good attendance, and Mr. W. P. Grant occupied the chair. Mr. C. A. Woods, of the Edison Laboratory, New Jersey, gave a short phonographic concert, which the audience greatly enjoyed. Mr. Paul Doucet recited in an interesting manner.

Speaking of the People's Forum in Winnipeg, Mr. Woodsworth said that it was doing a valuable service, especially for foreigners, aiming to break down religious and racial prejudices.

As his subject was the "Fair Deal to the Foreigner," he mentioned that in the year 1913-14, 384,478 people came to this country, and of this army 134,726 were non-English speaking. This diverse multitude it was the duty of Canadians to bind together and to adjust the social conditions that each one should be able to own his own plot of ground; build his own house

and thus he and his children became loyal Canadians and good citizens of this country.
