ture of the party to Banff, the inmates of the local camp have been reduced to about 700 which with the guard makes a total of about 1,000. The guard has suffered a reduction, too, twenty-one men being transferred to overseas battalions last week at their own request.

The men who have gone to Banff will be used on road-making work and other improvements in the Government park there, and considerable work is likely to be done in the park

before the end of the war.
