R. J. J. Newman, a well-known resident of Cape Vincent, who was in the city fo-day, explained that officers of the Canadian aeroplane corps admitted to bim the other day that the scare had probably arisen from trial flights made by aviators in training at

the school. According to these officers, the puplis who are receiving instruction in the art of aviation at the Kingston school before being sent to the front the France, are required, as a part of their training, to make trial flights of

their training, to make trial flights or many miles. Although the officers do not encourage their men to fly over American territory, several of the men have reported that in the darkness they have lost their hearings and

ness they have tost their hearings and flew over into the United States. For several weeks past Canadian military aeroplanes have hovered at high altitudes over Barriefield near Kingston. To residents of Cape Vincent, Mr. Newman explained, they ap-

peared to be directly over that village so high were they in the air. This has occurred both during the day and night.

The Canadian aviators received several weeks training in Kingston before being sent to the front. They are instructed in high attitude flying.
