

## KNOWN IN KINGSTON.

Gen. Logie Is a Graduate And Trustee of Queen's.

General Logie commanding at the National Expedition grounds, Toronto, and whose picture is on Page 1, is of Scotch origin and United Empire Loyalist descent, and was born in Hamilton in 1866. He is a son of Alexander L. Logie, judge of the County of Wentworth. He was educated at Queen's University, receiving his B.A. degree and the gold medal in classics in 1887, his M.A. in 1888, and his LL.B. in 1892. In 1890 he became a barrister and entered the legal firm of Chisholm and Logie of Hamilton. In 1892 he married Miss Mary Hamilton, second daughter of James H. Wylie, of Almonte, Ont.

General Logie has never seen active service. The nearest he got to it was when he was taking a college course at Kingston during the North-West rebellion. He was a private in the ranks, the rear rank at that, doing guard duty with the old 14th Regiment. On several occasions during his stay in Kingston he tried examinations for corporal stripes, but each time he failed. He afterwards served in Hamilton. General Logie has a long service decoration, is a member of the Canadian Military Institute, a trustee of Queen's University since 1910, and a bencher in the Law Society.

A great sorrow came to Gen. and Mrs. Logie some years ago in the drowning of his son, Cadet Logie, while returning to the Royal Military College from a canoe trip to Wolfe Island. The body was never recovered.
