In this connection it is ruggested that reformed methods of land taxation would free urban and suburban building lots from the grasp of speculators and promote the growth of garden suburbs for occupation by the wage-earning classes. Improvements in immigration methods and inspection are advised, as is also the creation of an Imperial Migration Board, representative of the United Kingdom and all the Dominious, in order that the man-power of the Empire may be conserved and time-expired soldiers be directed to the most suitable destinations after the war. The Commission devoted much time to the study of women's occupations and includes in its report a series of recommendation's intended to better conditions in these occupations. It is pointed out that vocational guidance is required in the public schools in order that boys and girls may be safeguarded against entering upon blindalley employments and led into fields of effort for which they are fitted. It is strongly recommended that a system of Government-assisted insurance against unemployment be established. The Commission is hopeful that its report may be influential in improving social and industrial conditions throughout Ontario and beyond.
