Ottawa, Jan. 19,-The annual reof the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, tabled in the Commons to-day, is a tribute to the very effective way in which handled the allen enemy situation in the Prairle Provinces since outbreak of the war. As a precautionary measure, owing to the large percentage of persons of enemy na-tionality in the west, the force was increased by 500 men when the war-The report declares that broke out, "the fair and impartial treatment of this population by the authorities. and the admirable self-restraint the part of the loyal population tinward the enemy allens, and the recognition by these nationalities that as long as they pursued their ordinary vocations and refrained from inimical acts they would not be rested or interfered with," produced a singularly quiet and orderly year in the west. It has now been found to be unnecessary to keep the extra 500 men, and nearly all of them have taken their discharges in order join the overseas forces. The present Northwest Mounted

Police force consists of sixty officers and 869 non-commissioned and constables. By a redistribution of the force the strength has been increased in Alberta and decreased in Saskatchewan. During the year arms were seized from 350 aliens, 396 were 326 paroled. interned and were 32 murders during the year, and every one of the accused, with one exception, was landed by the police and brought to trial. The total number of crimes reported last year was the smallest since 1912.
