GERMAN PROFESSORS

Were Spies, and Three Were Interned

New York, Feb. 1.—The Herald publishes a long story from Melbourne,

giving particulars of a plot of four German savants, doctors Pénck, Goldstein. Gredner and Pringshelm, who attended a meeting of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, held in Australia in August and September, 1914. They demanded

the right, as international scientists,

to be treated as neutrals, and to be permitted to return to Germany. Goldstein and Penck promptly took the asth of neutrality and Goldstein went to Java and Penck to England.
