INTERVIEW WITH PASTOR TAPPERT

He's Angry With Canadian
Press for Calling Ger-
mans Barbarians.

Berlin, Ont., Feb. 10.—Rev. Reinhold Tappert, pastor of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, one of the largest congregations in this city, gave The Star the following interview, the sentiment of which is surprising, to say the least. Mr. Tappert, who was born in Germany, but who was a citizen of the United States, is not naturalized in Canada. His remarks following were given very freely and unprececeded by any discussion to lead up to them. The Star merely asked him for his interpretation of the present situation in and around Berlin.

"There is a great deal of bitterness here," said Mr. Tappert, "among Germans and those of German descent, arising out of the numerous untrue things that have been and are being said about Germany in the Canadian papers. Not only untrue statements of all sorts, but ugly names such as Hun and barbarian have been directed against Germans as a people. The press should have been more considerate. I believe if all these tales had not been printed, that bitterness would not have been called forth."
