of the allied cause, but there were betrayers in neutral countries, and there had been betrayers even in Great Britain. Three minutacturers there, had sold essentials of war to agents of the Kaiser, and they had been punished as they deserved. The Swiss and the French governments had also punished similar betrayers, but in Canada where there had been worse treachery shown, the facts regarding the officers at Amherst and the punishment which followed it, and been carefully suppressed officially, although many people were aware privately of what had occurred.

The Senator said it was up to the government to stand by Canada and

not to consider friendship for any individual. An offence had been committed and parliament and the country ought to know what punishment had been handed out. "Let us have no traitors in the cafp, and let not the government support them or shield them," he concluded.
