hended. The escape was of the most ingenuous character and it is a wonder that the whole forty prisoners did not escape at the same time. The men escaped by tunneling a dis-

tance of 111 feet under the wall of the building and past the outer fence of the exhibition grounds. The work was done at night, the men working three or four at a time and using tools manufactured out of all sorts of odds and

hard time to recapture them, as they may be able to reach the boundary and cross into the United States
