COCHRANE. Ont.. May 15.—One man dead, nine seriously wounded, several fatally, and four injured, is the result of an outbreak instituated

several fatally, and four injured, is the result of an outbreak instigated by 300 Austrian prisoners who arrived at Kapuskasing prison camp, sixty miles west of here, on the Transcontinental rallway, from Potawawa on Wednesday last under guard of on Wednesday last under guard of the nine (lundred other immates of

the nine hundred other inmates of the camp prittipated, occurred on Friday, and the riot lasted several hours, as well as fring on the prisoners. General Lorie, commanding the Toronto district, is in camp conducting an investigation. The new half-already—given-considerable trouble at Petawawa, refused to go to work and turned on their guards.

There was no casualties among the soldiers.

Refused to Work

show that on Friday morning, the newly arrived Austrians who had heen sent from Petawawa refused to do manual labor.
