

ALL QUIET AT KAPUSKASING ONLY FOUR ALIENS HURT

Slightly Wounded by Bayonets—No
Soldiers Injured—Gen. Logie Com-
pliments Lieut-Col. Royce.

Toronto, May 19.—Brig.-Gen. Logie and Lt.-Col. J. S. Campbell returned this morning from Kapuskasing alien internment camp. Gen. Logie said four prisoners had been slightly wounded in the recent disorder there.

"Lt.-Col. J. C. Royce handled a difficult situation very well," said Gen. Logie. "Sixty Austrians, recently transferred from Kingston, refused to work. They were placed

under arrest preparatory to being removed to an island in the river near the main camp. Sympathizers made a rush for the guard with the intention of freeing them. There was some scuffling before the alarm was sounded and all the troops turned out. Then the disturbers were ordered to return to their quarters. When they refused to do so the troops drove them with bayonets. In this way the casualties occurred. Not one of the guards was hurt."
