wawa was received by the Mayor this morning from a prominent Toronto business man, whose son is now at the camp. He bitterly scores the authorities for the manner in which the soldiers are being treated. He mays in part:

"Rain or shine, the men eat their meals in the open. All the food that can melt disapears quickly bepfore a broiling sun, while it is almost impossible to eat during a rain storm.

broiling sun, while it is almost impossible to eat during a rain storm. Yet rain or shine, the men must eat without any cover over their heads for themselves or the food. During a review held recently, they were forced to stand in a violent rain

storm for fifteen minutes before they weer ordered to put on their great-coats, and by that time they were soaked to the skin.
