

TWO GERMANS ARRESTED

ACCUSED OF ASSISTING IN GET-
AWAY AT FORT HENRY

Military Police Took Them in Charge
At Finky Station, and Lodged
Them in the Police Station—Will
Be Taken Over To Fort Henry.

That they assisted in the recent escape of two Germans from Fort Henry, is the charge lodged against two young lieutenants, who were taken in charge by the military police on Monday night, and lodged in the police station. They will be taken over to Fort Henry.

Lieut Col. G. H. Gillespie made the arrangements for the arrest, and the young Germans were taken quite a surprise when the military police rounded them up. They first gave some resistance, but after a while decided to go without making any further trouble. The men are registered at Fort Henry under the names of Kanger and Schneider.

Their effects were searched at the police station, and among the lot were found papers from the German-American Society of New York.

Major Campbell, commandant at Fort Henry, had the recent escape of the two Germans investigated, and it is understood that as a result of this investigation, suspicion was directed on these two young fellows. One of the young men has been working as a chess-maker and the other has been working for a farmer. For some time they both were employed in Kingston.

The two prisoners had money, and on Tuesday noon had a first-class meal served in the lock-up.
