ployes to avert a strike was made by Sir Robert Borden at now to-day, following a full Cabinet meeting. If the two parties fail to come to terms it is believed the Government will be prepared to take drastic action, as it is fully realized that a strike at the present time would be a national disaster. The statement was as follows:

"The Government regards as a matter of grave concern the probability of a strike on the Canadian Pacific Railway system. The fine spirit of patriotism which animates the employes is thoroughly recognized by the Government and a like spirit

actuates those responsible for the management of the company. This public appeal is made in order that both parties may consider anew the attitude which they have assumed.

"The rights of the employes and those of the company, whatever they may be, are entitled to every respect and common equition, but the rights of the public must also be taken into security and the Government cannot forged its sury as graves of those rights. This duty is especially imperative in time of those rights.
