SUSPICION BLINDING

REASONABLE PEOPLE Daily Telegraph's Comment on

American Blacklist Note and Viscount Grey's Reply.

By Canadian Press. London, Nov. 15. - The morning newspapers generally give no particular prominence to Viscount

Grey's reply to the American black list note. The Daily Telegraph, however, comments editorially on

the reply and says of the American note: "We wonder whether a more striking example could be found of a manner in which interest and sus-

picion can cause reasonable persons to be blind to a plain consideration of principle and right.

"The black list is based on a clear principle of national sovereignty. No fair minded American can dispute the justice of this assertion, but the Americans have not regarded the situation from this standpoint.

Their eyes have been fixed on the principle that neutrals have the right to trade with any and all the belligerents and they have not perceived that this right must recessar-

ily be modified if a belligerent exercises his undoubted right to forbid his own nationals to trade wing reutral firms. As to the American tra-

picion that the blacklist conceals a desire to forward British trade at the expense of neutral commette, we trust that Viscount Crez's strongly reiterated renunciation of any such design may quiet suspicion.
