Paris, Nov. 23.—The prospects of the French merchant marine after the war was the subject of an interpellation in the Chamber of Deputies today by Deputy Andre Heese, who is dissatisfied with the 120 million francs for new constructions and 80 million francs for the purchase of merchant ships voted by Parliament. "Before the war," he said, "our mercantle marine occupied the fifth place among the nations.
