

J. G. WING OF KITCHENER STRANGELY DISAPPEARS

SIX AUTOMOBILE PARTIES HUNT
FOR HIM ALL NIGHT AND
DAY IN VAIN.

Kitchener, Dec. 12.—J. G. Wing, a well-known and successful real estate agent of this city, mysteriously disappeared last night, and has not been seen or heard of since. He left his home at 7.30 o'clock, stating that he would return at 9 o'clock. Not receiving any message from him, the family became anxious and asked the police to call at the office. Mr. Wing could not be found, and during the night six automobiles made search of the city and vicinity, which was continued to-day without success. It is supposed that he lost his memory and has wandered away to some place as yet unknown. He has not been in the best of health during the last few days. The search is still in progress.

Naturalizing Enemy Aliens Objected To

Kitchener, Dec. 12.—Applications of three hundred and twenty-seven aliens, more than three hundred being of enemy birth, were submitted to the Court of General Sessions here this afternoon, composed of Judge Hanning, Judge Reade and Magistrate Blake of Galt. Several applicants were called and examined. They were represented by A. L. Bitzer. No objection was offered to granting naturalization to aliens of countries friendly to the allies or from neutral countries, but D. T. Heisey, who was represented by E. W. Clement, offered objections to the naturalizations of aliens of enemy birth. The latter quoted Chief Justice Meredith's decision that no aliens of enemy birth should be naturalized during the progress of the war. The court decided to adjourn the sitting until December 22nd.

WRITS AGAINST POLICE.

Woman Arrested Was Unjustly Accused of Theft.

Stratford, Dec. 12.—Writs have been issued against Chief of Police Lannin and Police Sergeant Aitchison by Harding, Owens & Goodwin acting for Mrs. Annie McTavish Charles street, for unstated damage on charges of alleged unlawful arrest, trespass, assault and slander. The case arises out of an accusation made by a Mornington street resident against Mrs. McTavish, who was working at her home on September 16, of taking \$20 from a purse. The police were called in. The woman who accused Mrs. McTavish later discovered that she had drawn only \$ from the bank instead of \$25 as she supposed, hence there had been no theft.
