"This new object has been committed in at least three cities. At Gembloux, two chiefs of the local agency of the relief committee, and two other members of the organiz.

ation were deported. At Libramoni

21 employes of the National Relief Committee were deported. During a slave raid at Arlon 43 employes of the local regional agencies of the Relief Commission were among four hundred men taken to Germany.

"This suffices to prove that when the German authorities defend their policy of deportations on the ground that they are thus checking unemployment, they are merely trying to bluff neutrals."
