Provost Marshal Osborne, of the London district, appeared on the scene and ordered the soldiers to disperse, but without effect and he at once sent a call to Galt for a guard. -The soldiers again raided the office,

doing more damage and two members of the newly elected council were injured. H. N. Bowman was struck on

the head and is in a serious condition from concussion of the brain, and N. Asmussen was hit on the forehead but not so seriously injured. The Provost Marshal again ordered the men to disperse, and Mayor Hart deciared martial law. The arrival of the hundred men from Gait put an end to the disorder.
