

ENFORCE MILITIA ACT, ST. KITTS WILL URGE

ALSO STATE CONTROL OF MUNITIONS, TO REMOVE OBSTACLE TO RECRUITING.

St. Catharines, Jan. 9.—Acting upon the suggestion of Judge Campbell, speaking at the inaugural meeting on Monday, the City Council named the Executive Committee to draft a resolution for presentation at the next regular meeting, and if passed to be forwarded to Premier Borden and the Cabinet, urging that steps be taken at once for enforcement of the militia act. It is understood that a resolution will be drawn up also to ask that the Federal Government consider State control of munitions plants, so that the barrier arising out of ownership of these by private capital and for private gain will be overcome. This is found to operate against recruiting, and the Liberal paper here is calling upon the Council and the Government to remove this excuse, as was done in Britain before Lord Derby's scheme was put in effect.

ALIENS TRIED TO LEAVE.

Fined, and One Sent Back to City He Had Left.

Sarnia, Jan. 9.—Heriman Swartz was taken from a Grand Trunk train here last night by immigration officers as an alien enemy who was attempting to leave Canada. Swartz had in his possession a letter from Mayor Hett of Kitchener, certifying that he had been resident there for thirty-four years, and was going to Cleveland on a month's visit. He admitted, however, that he had never been naturalized. He was fined \$10 and was sent back to Kitchener. Two Sarnia foreigners who were also picked up at the Tunnel Station while inquiring for a train for Cleveland also appeared in Police Court to-day. They were on the local registry and were fined \$50 each.
