Miller obtained a commission in the Royal Flying Corps, but on receiving the information that it would be many months before he would see service in France with this unit, he decided to join the 79th, and sail with the next draft, which leaves shortly for England: S. J. Williams, who graduated from McGill as a mining engineer, later taking a course at Culvert Military Academy. When the Mexican trouble started in 1914 he enlisted with the City Troop of Philadelphia and saw many months' service on the Mexican border; W. A. Merritt, H. F. Yates and J.
