Disease-Feels His Humiliating Position Keenly. Count von Sudow, one of the allen enemies of Fort Henry Internment

Camp, is in the General Hospital in a weak condition and is not expected to recover from his illness. The count was one of the first Germans of Canada to be arrested and intern-

ed when the war broke out. He feels his position keenly and though an enemy much sympathy is Mi for his particular case. - He was a resident engineer on construction work for the C.P.R. when

the war broke out being in the staff of C. W. P. Ramsay, Chief Engineer for Eastern Construction, but now overseas as brigadier of a Railway Construction br gade. The count did not use his title, however, but as a highly competent engineer was highly esteemed by the high officials of

the C.P.R. and had a personal sequaintance with late Charles M. Hays, vice-president. When the war broke out the count was one of many aliens who made the mistake of trying to get out of the country. He went off not because of the war, but on a personal

matter. After his capture he was brought to Fort Henry along with other men including Mundheim who was general manager of the Canada Cement Products of Quebec. Since coming to the fort he has been stricken with chross's of the liver and his treatment on the doctor's orders of a quart of ale a day
