HUSBAND AND SON DEAD WITHIN YEAR Pte. T. H. Hill Died of Wounds

Two Days Before Nine-

teenth Birthday

SERGT. ALEX. KIDD DEAD
Was Veteran of Boer War —

Had Five Brothers Fighting
in the Present
Conflict

Just two days before his nineteenth

birthday, which he was planning to celebrate in the trenches, Pte. Thomas Herbert Hill died of severe wounds on March 24 in No. 42 Casualty Clearing Station, France. He had written his mother, Mrs. Thomas H. Hill, of 551 St. Urbain street, telling her of his approaching birthday and expressing the hope that the next would be spent with her, the letter being dated March

16. This is Mrs. Hill's second bereave-

ment within eight months, her only

son having bidden her farewell at the funeral of his father, the late Mr. Thomas Henry Hill, a month before he sailed with the 148th from Valcartier. He reached France last November and was twice transferred to different units, and at last into a machine-gun section.

For the ten months prior to enlisting he served in the Composite forces at Spirit Lake, guarding the interned Austrians, at the internment camp there. He came home for the holidays

in 1915 and enlisted in Lt.-Col. Magee's

unit, which was just being formed. Nearly two score relatives are in

France, none of whom have been seriously injured. His uncle, Henry Wm. Martin, is chief petty officer of H.M.S. Iron Duke, and has been in the navy many years. Pte. Hill was a Mount St. Louis cadet for three years.

SERGT. ALEX. KIDD.

Sergt. Alex. Kidd, a veteran of the Boer War and one of six brothers fighting under the British flag, died of sickness in No. 7 Stationary Hospital at Harfleur on March 28. A letter received by Mrs. Kidd at 815 Alma street two days after the potification

of his death spoke of the writer hav-

ing sustained a fall on March 4 which

resulted in broken ribs and an injury to his hip.

He is the first of his family to lose his life during the war. His eldest brother, Lieut. William, is fighting in South Africa with General Botha's army; Edward and Stewart are both with the Scottish Horse; Francis, formerly with the C.P.R. offices, went with a Montreal artillery unit and is at present on the headquarters staff in England, and Charles is with another Scottish regiment.

Sergt. Kidd went with a Guards bat-

talion a year ago and was wounded

on the Somme front September 19 with

shrapnel in the hip and thigh. He is 37 years of age and was formerly employed with the C.P.R. police at Farnham. Their sixth child, an infant, died in October after Sergt. Kidd went overseas. Five others, the oldest aged 12, remain at home with their mother.
