Their Work—Veteran Said He
Was Refused Job.

OFFICERS LOOK ON WHILE IT HAPPENED

TORONTO, April 14.—Following Thursday night's invasion of city estaurants by soldiers, to round up lien enemy employes, a raid by returned soldiers on the plant of the tussell Motor Company, corner of King and Dufferin streets, was carried out last night, with the result that about a score of foreigners were taken from the works. No lamage was done. About half a sundred veterans took part in the invasion.

Voteran Planned Raids.

The raid was organized by Lance-Corporal Chas. O'Brien, who fought n Flanders with the 21st (Torono) Battalion, and was wounded at he Somme. He told H. D. Scully, anager of the factory, that when applied for work a few days so he was told by a foreigner at the gate to "Get to hell out of up by two other soldiers and Col. H. C. Osborne, Assistant Adjutant-General at the camp, who, with members of his staff, had arrived n the scene, who asked Mr. Scully t he would give assurance that sturned soldiers would have the reference. Mr. Scully promised to rite a letter to this effect tomor-OW.

Corporal O'Brien and the colonel rere hoisted shoulder high and oudly cheered, and a large crowd on Dufferin street added their rolces.

Several city police, a squad of military police, and a platoon of the trish Fusiliers, who were sent untred to quell any disorder, and a number of officers, watched the proceedings, but there was no interference with the raiders.

The employes of the factory were assured that if they possessed registration papers they would not be nolested.

Manager Scully denied a statement by one of the foremen that there were over 100 alien enemies employed. He stated that only three per cent. of the 3,000 employes were foreigners, and that if there were any alien enemies among them they had been brought fown from Kapuskasing intenment samp by Government permission.
