

DRASTIC DEMANDS BY WINDSOR VETERANS

**GOUST SINGLE SLACKERS FROM
GOVT. JOBS—SELL LANDS OF
ALIEN ENEMIES, ETC.**

(Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Windsor, May 17.—The members of Windsor and District Veterans' Association, in session here, passed resolutions asking that all Government positions held by unmarried men who have not offered to enlist be declared vacant, and that returned soldiers be appointed.

The delegates also have decided that all lands held by alien enemies should be sold, and the proceeds turned over to the Red Cross Society and the association.

Another resolution declared that all subjects of enemy countries, naturalized or otherwise, should be disfranchised.

A minimum salary for civil employees of \$1,000 a year, and a pension for soldiers rendered incapable by wounds, of \$1,200 a year, were among other recommendations of the association.

CHURCHES FLOURISHING IN PERTH DEANERY

**REV. R. H. A. HASLAM TELLS OF
THE POWER OF PRAYER
IN INDIA.**

Stratford, May 17.—The Anglican churches in Perth Deanery are flourishing, it was shown in reports presented at the annual session at Sebringville this afternoon and evening, under the Presidency of Rural Dean Rev. W. T. Cluff of St. James' Church, Stratford.

Trinity Church, where the Deanery met, had handsome new choir pews to greet the delegates. Christ Church, Milverton, has had an electric lighting system installed. St. James' Church, St. Mary's, finished the year with \$400 balance after providing a retiring allowance to Rev. J. W. Taylor.

The Deanery's regrets that Mr. Taylor and Rev. J. W. Hodgins, St. Paul's Church, Stratford, are resigning through ill-health, were expressed in a resolution.

An invitation to hold the fall session in St. Mary's was accepted.

Addresses were given by Rev. R. H. A. Haslam of Kangra, India, who presented a comprehensive story of the power of prayer among the natives of that country, and Rev. J. N. H. Mills, assistant rector of St. Paul's here, a new member of the Deanery, who advocated a revival of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew in the Anglican churches of this district.

WOMEN TAXI DRIVERS.

Edinburgh, Scotland, May 17.—The Edinburgh municipal authorities have decided, owing to the scarcity of male labor, to license women as taxicab drivers. The decision is bitterly resented by the taxicab men, who threaten to strike.
