the matter and at once instructed Chief Carroll to take action. The Chief dfd so, placing Kruger under arrest, and on Tuesday morning he arrest, and on Tuesday morning he was-given a hearing before Police Magistrate Stewart. Messrs Sam-mon, O'Brien and Mulligan were called as witness with the Crown Attorney presenting, and on the evidence produced the Ma-gistrate committed the prisoner for trial. Neither the Police Magistrate nor County Judge have jurisdiction to try the charge, so that Kruger will have to remain in gaol

until December, unless admitted to bail in the meantime. This is the first prosecution here on the charge of sedition since the outbreak of war, and the case has aroused considerable interest, a large crowd being present for the preliminary hearing. The offence is one punishable, according to the

statutes, by a two-year penitentiary farm.

Kruger is a man over fifty years of age, is married and has a large family. He was born in Canada. though of German descent.
