

JUGOSLAV COMMITTEE APPEALS FOR AID

Asks the British Dominions to Help Form State at End of War

Ottawa, July 20.—At the opening of the House to-day Sir Robert Borden tabled a letter from Sir George Perley, accompanying a manifesto issued by the Yugoslav Committee in London and addressed to the representatives of the British Dominions. This manifesto, after dealing with the persecutions to which Yugoslavs (Serbs, Croats and Slovenes) are subjected under Austro-Hungarian rule, appeals to the British Dominions for their aid in the formation of a new Yugoslav State in Europe at the conclusion of the war.

The manifesto states that the policy of Austria-Hungary has been to crush the Yugoslav national life. Corrupt German and Hungarian officials have endeavored to divide the eight million people composing the Yugoslav nation subject to Austrian rule, and the German policy of oppression has resulted in economic decay. There are at present in Europe, when the Serbs are taken into consideration, twelve million Yugoslavs. If formed into an independent State, they would constitute a strong guarantee for peace, and prove formidable opponents to pan-Germanism.

The manifesto expresses the belief of the Yugoslav Committee that the British Dominions will have an important voice in the great adjustment which must take place in Europe at the conclusion of the war, and for this reason makes this appeal to them.

BOWMAN AND CLIFFORD CAPTURE MANY PRIZES

GUELPH AND OSHAWA BREEDERS ARE VERY SUCCESSFUL AT BRANDON FAIR.

Brandon, Man., July 20.—James Bowman of Guelph got the reserve senior championship in the Aberdeen-Angus, first for bulls two years old, first for heifer two-year-olds, first for senior yearling, second and fourth for graded herd, third for junior herd, first for junior bull calf, and many second and third placings at the fair here yesterday.

Clifford of Oshawa won the junior Hereford championship and first for junior yearling bulls with Brae Real. In aged bulls he captured second, second in class heifers two years old, first for junior heifer yearling and senior heifer calf with Florina Fairfax and Perfection Lass respectively. In graded herd bulls and four females, any age, Clifford was second, while he landed first for three calves under one year, bred and owned by the exhibitor. In group of two progeny of one cow, Clifford got third and fifth, and second and fourth in group of three animals, any age or sex.
