ROUNDED UP ON STREETS UNDER THE ALIENS ACT Many of These Fellows Refuse to

FOURTEEN AUSTRIANS

Work Except for Exorbitant Wages

A pretty clean sweep was made of Austrians by the police on Thursday when nearly a score of them, who were apparently determined to hold the farmers up for a prohibitive wage were rounded up and taken before

Police Magistrate Fraser. It was found that most of the men failed to produce their registration certificates, others had not registered, while others had just dropped into town with-

out permission to travel from the authorities in their home towns. They

were accordingly indicted under the Aliens Registration Act. Magistrate Fraser inflicted fines,

and improved the occasion by giving strict warning that if the men would not go to work, they would be brought

before him under the Vagrant Act and sent for a salutory term to jail. Farmers were offering \$3.50, with

board and lodging, per day, but the foreigners simply sniffed at the figure.

The minimum wage that they would look at was \$4 per day, while some of them demanded as high as \$6 per day before they would consent to com-

mence operations.

The fines and costs inflicted were

Harry Koreat, \$10.25 each. Frank Glenbaski, for a minor offence, was

assessed the costs of the court.
