IF ANY WON'T WORK **NEITHER SHOULD HE EAT**

AT LEAST KITCHENER MANUFAC-TURERS WOULD HAVE ALIEN ENEMIES INTERNED.

(Special Despatch to The Globs.) Kitchener, Oct. 7.—The Kitchener (Special Despatch to The Globe.)

Kitchener, Oct. 7.—The Kitchener Manufacturers' Association has forwarded an appeal to the Minister of Labor, Hon T. W. Crothers, soliciting his co-operation in dealing with a labor situation which is present in most of the larger eities of the Province. The appeal declares that there are large numbers of allen enemy laborers, Bulgarlan and Austrian, who positively refuse to work unless they are paid prohibitive wages. In ordinary times, it is pointed out, the Government cannot compel men to work so long as they have visible means of support, but the local manufacturers think that under the existing conditions, when the Government is doing everything possible in the way of conserving labor, as well as food, there is no reason why allen laborers should be allowed to live on the tollers who are working overtime to produce more food, and they be consumers, and denothing to help win the war. The Labor Department is asked to take immediate action regarding these allems who refuse to work, and if they refuse to work when a fair wage is offered, that they he sent to an internment camp, where their food is regulated by the Government.
