

NO HOMESTEAD FOR ALIEN ENEMY

New Order Does Not Bar Any Alien Naturalized Who is in C.E.F.

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, Nov. 18.—An order in Council has been passed providing that no application for an entry for a homestead in Western Canada shall be granted unless the applicant was a British subject at the commencement of the war and has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of one of the allied or neutral countries. This new regulation will not apply to any alien-born person naturalized since the commencement of the war who is a member of the Canadian Expeditionary Forces, or who has been honorably discharged from the Canadian army.

CONSCRIPT NEWFOUNDLANDERS?

St. John's, Nfld., Nov. 18.—Selective conscription may be adopted in Newfoundland as in Canada, in order to maintain the strength of the colony's overseas forces, in the opinion of Government officials here. It was stated to-day that the stream of reinforcements which has sent six thousand men from the island to the firing line in the past three years has virtually dried up, notwithstanding a vigorous recruiting campaign, and the colonial Government has been advised that the Newfoundland Regiment, which has figured conspicuously in official statements, both at Gallipoli and on the Western front, must soon be withdrawn unless more men are forthcoming.

PARIS TEACHER ARRESTED.

Paris, Nov. 15.—Helene Brion, thirty-five years old, a teacher in an infant school, has been arrested charged with carrying on anti-military propaganda. The *Matin* says that others, teachers for the most part, are implicated in the affair. One of her acquaintances was Miguel Almercyda, the editor of *The Bonnet Rouge*, who died in prison after having been arrested on the charge of sedition. She went to London in December, 1913, and took part in a suffragette window smashing demonstration there.

London, Nov. 18.—Capt. Malcolm McGregor and Lieut. Norman Keys receive the Military Cross at Buckingham Palace. The King also received Lord Northcliffe.

Hon. W. S. FIELDING'S NEPHEW KILLED
