VETERANS THREATEN IF WISHES IGNORED Internment of Aliens or Their

Use at \$1.10 a Day Is Demanded.

Bitter feeling against exemption being granted to aliens was expressed at a largely attended meeting of

B Company, G.W.V.A., held at Colum-

bus Hall last night. After a warm discussion, in which the veterans bitterly complained that a premium was being placed on eligibles being of alien descent, the

following resolutions, moved by Geo. Murell, secretary of B Company, were enthusiastically endorsed:

"That B Company, G.W.V.A., representing 900 returned men, again demand that immediate steps be

taken by the Government to conscript all aliens of military age resident in Canada, and compel these

shirkers to serve equally with British subjects; and, further, demand that

all Germans, Austrians, Bulgarians, and Turks of military age be either interned or compelled to engage in work of national importance, such work not to include the manufacture of munitions, and to be paid for at the rate of \$1.10 a day or less. We further warn the Government that unless this be done this assembly of returned soldiers may be compelled

to take stronger measures than the passing of resolutions."
"That B Company, G.W.V.A., ex-presses the utmost dissatisfaction at the ease with which thousands of physically fit men in this city have obtained exemption, and calls atten-tion to this matter, which, with the granting of complete exemption to naturalized aliens, is fast becoming a

scandal." The political situation was discussed, and while no formal resolution

was adopted, it was the feeling of the meeting that B Company should not connect itself politically to any party. It was agreed, however, that winthe-war candidates should be supported, preference being given to re-

turned soldiers where they are candidates.
