This they resented because, although Mrs. Spade was born in Germany she was taken to the United States as a very little girl. Mr. Spade is an American of German extraction, his grandfather having emigrated to the United States. Mr. Spade's family consists two boys and three girls, the eldest

being married to a soldier of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, and the eldest boy having just qualified for a first-class war badge for 200 hours duty in the Boy Scouts' uniform, which he was wearing when interviewed to-day.

In the street he was forced to kiss a large Union Jack which was carried by one of the soldiers, and as soon as he did so the pail of grease was emptied over his head. Some attempt was also made to feather him as well.
"They had no reason to suspect my loyalty," Mr. Spade said to The

I call him my boy because he lived me since he was a very little boy. He is an orphan whose mother used to be a neighbor of our and we brought him up. Here is a letter from him.
