"Events are now ripening; la the Fat East which should give German. politicians a clear mat. Japan and Germany, are two world powers, between which there is not the least confifet of interests, because, Cermany has no military interests In the Pacilic. She wants only to satisfy her commercial interests in Eastern Asia and for many years will not create competition for Japan, buts rather furnish her useful sources of income. Therefore we do not doubt for a minute that these two powers will, within a short time, understand, each other politically and cease, pursuing each other because of the identity of their interests."
