

FOUR APPLIED FOR NATURALIZATION AT GENERAL SESSIONS

Grand Jury Return True Bills in All Criminal Cases

In the court of General Sessions, now sitting at the Court House, the case of A. Scott vs. Dr. Bromley, a suit for wages and account for goods, the plaintiff was given full amount of his claim, together with costs amounting in all to \$203. Mr. J. L. O'Flynn appeared for the plaintiff and Mr. J. McEwen for the defendant.

True bills were brought in by the grand jury against John A. McEacheren, on a charge of obstructing an officer of the peace; against William Brooks on a charge of stealing; against Antonio Cerom for obtaining money under false pretences; and against Edith Cantwell for fraudulently converting money.

Before any of the cases were commenced this morning the Crown Attorney G. W. Goodwin read the names of four men who had made application for naturalization. These were:

D. Atkinson, 476 Wellington street, age 24 a switchman at the steel plant, who came to this city fourteen years ago from Soo, Michigan.

Karl Johnson, 51 Knox avenue, who is employed at the Open Hearth furnaces at the steel plant, who is a widower with four children and owns a farm on St. Joseph's Island. He came from Sweden in 1909, where he was previously a farmer.

Herbert Rosevear Lash, a married man and a merchant doing business on John street this city. He came here from Bay City, Michigan.

Salvador Rondi, an Italian, aged about twenty-three years, backed out at last and did not appear before the judge for naturalization. A constable went out to find him and reported to the judge that the man had changed his mind. No reason was given, so the judge decided that he was a subject of an allied country and evading military service and ordered that he be reported and taken in charge for military service.
