IMPORTANT TO RAISE STANDARDS OF LIVING

COUNSEL TO UKRAINIANS THIRD EDUCATIONAL CONVENTION.

(Canadian Press Despatch.) Saskatoon, Dec. 27.—Ukrainian delegates from all parts of Canada gathered here yesterday for the third Educational Convention. Swanson, Professor of Economics at

University of Saskatchewan. gave the only address in English in the afternoon, dealing with the sub-ject of "Economic and Social Conditions of Agriculture After the War." He emphasized very strongly the importance of raising the standards of living, to make cultural material and social progress possible. spoke at some length of the standard of living being very low in the countries from which the Ukrainians had emigrated, and compared it with the much higher standard in Canada.

Professor Swanson declared that
