## NO PLACE IN CANADA FOR BOLSHEVISM

Returned Men to Unite With Calgary Comrades in Drastic Resolution

## RESENT I.W.W. PROPAGANDA

War veterans in Winniper will accept the challenge of the Bolsheviki by demanding the deportation of 'red' Socialists, I.W.W.'s and other agitators as undesirable citizens.

A resolution, similar to the

one adopted by the Great War Veterans at Calgary, will be adopted by the Winnipeg unit at the next meeting of the executive, according to John O. Newston, vice-president.

"Do you think we are going to six with folded arms while Bolsheviki

here try to do to Canada what the Huns did to France and Belgium?" asked one veteran, when asked his opinion. "If the 'reds' think they are going to get away with any of this 'Russian stuff' here, they have another think coming."

The arrest or deportation of those who gave voice to Bolsheviki sentiments at the Calgary labor convention was demanded in a resolution adopted Monday evening by the Calgary Great War Veterans' association.

The resolution follows:

"Whereas, it is learned from the reports in the press of the western labor conference at their convention held in Calgary, on March 15, that a resolution was passed placing itself on record as being in full accord and

sympathy with the Russian Bolsheviki and German Spartacan revolution; and whereas it has sent its felicitations to its comrades in Germany and Bolsheviks elsewhere, and that resolutions were passed at the same convention favoring joint committees being formed between labor and soldiers' associations; be it recommand is in thorough sympathy with organized labor, nevertheless we believe that the action of the western labor conference at their convention in Calgary, in preaching revolution and riot should be severely condemned and that steps should be taken by the central government to either arrest or deport the leading apostles of anarchy, sedition and disloyalty. And be it further resolved that we resent the association of the name of the returned soldier with any organization that sends its felicitations to its comrades in Germany and Bolsheviks elsewhere." The resolution passed by the provincial command is being sent to the Dominion command for further action. The Calgary Trades and Labor Council at a special meeting tonight probably will endorse the stand of their delegates in supporting the policy of industrial unionism announced by the labor congress here last week. The trades council some time ago passed a resolution practically along these lines. The council also will arrange for the conference between laborites and veterans to be held here shortly.
