

TORONTO BOLSHEVIKI TO BE DEPORTED SOON

Enemy Aliens Rounded Up as Firebrands Confess Giving Names of Citizens.

As a result of a joint round-up by the police and Canadian immigration and Provincial authorities, the Bolshevik and revolutionary activities have been laid bare of Liel Samsonavitch, alias Samson, Black and Charnie; Arthur Ewart, alias Arthur Ewit, and Lita Zaborowski, alias Annie Bancourt, A. E. Brown and Mrs. Ewit, who are now in custody awaiting deportation. According to the police, the prisoners are firebrands of the worst type, and have given the police information laying bare the secret operations of seditious organizations in Canada.

Samsonavitch was a student of Columbia University, who was expelled for seditious utterances, who attempted to enter Toronto University after coming to Canada. He was turned down as an undesirable, but on several dates addressed socialist gatherings in Broadway Hall.

Ewart is a native German, according to his papers, who came to Canada in 1914. The woman Zaborowski was also a German and she went with Ewart as her husband.

Literature which was seized showed Bolsheviki propoganda has penetrated the Toronto branches of the Communist Party, the International Workers, the General Workers' Union, and the Revolutionary and Anarchistic parties. The names and addresses of the leaders of the movements are given who are Russians, Germans, Jews and a sprinkling of Canadian and English. Among the leaders are an Irishman, a Finlander, two Dutchmen and two Englishmen.

The police, say the prisoners, now the game is up, have confessed everything and say that the greatest efforts were made to inveigle the legitimate labor party, one of which was the "One Big Union" idea.

Deported Under Laws.

"It is under the Immigration Act of 1910," said James C. Mitchell, immigration inspector, "that we are going to deport "Charles Charni," whose real name is Lieb Samsonavitch and the two Germans, Otto Ewart and his pseudo wife.

"The Immigration Act says that anyone who enters Canada contrary to the Act may be deported. The three people in question all entered Canada by stealth, after having been refused admittance by the officials at the border. If they were to be sentenced in Canada for the offence, it would have to be a jail sentence, not a fine. Of course, their conduct while here has had some effect on our action in this matter.

"During the last three weeks I have been conducting a board of enquiry under oath as I am empowered to do by the Act. I have submitted all the evidence to the Commissioner of Immigration at Ottawa and have made out orders for their deportation.

Appeal Is Possible.

"Should any of them appeal against my order of deportation, the evidence will go to the Minister at Ottawa and the final decision will rest with him.

"The three will be deported as soon as possible. Of course, it will be impossible to deport the two to Germany until a treaty is signed with Germany. The difficulty in deporting 'Charni' is that there is only one method of communication with Russia, the one through Vancouver and Yokohama.
