

PRESS CENSOR CENSORS NO MORE

But Publishers and Others
Are Held Responsible—
Orders Still Valid

(Canadian Press Despatch.)

Ottawa, April 30. — Press censorship under the direction of the Press Censor, ceases to-day. The provisions of the War Measures Act and the orders in Council and regulations made thereunder will still remain in effect, but responsibility for seeing that they are complied with will rest upon publishers, importers, distributors and persons having objectionable matter in their possession. All publications which have been placed under the censorship ban will continue to be forbidden circulation in Canada.

The order in Council respecting unlawful associations was repealed some weeks ago. The order in Council respecting objectionable literature was amended at the same time. Newspapers printed in the enemy languages, namely, German, Hungarian, Bulgarian and Turkish, are, however, still prohibited from publication or circulation in Canada.

THE LADIES' WEAR EXPORT ASSOCIATION

ORGANIZATION IS SENDING TO
EUROPE A REPRESENTATIVE
TO SECURE ORDERS.

Ottawa, April 30.—After a conference with the Canadian Trade Commission, manufacturers of women's garments in Canada, representing ninety-five per cent. of the trade, organized under the name of "The Ladies' Wear Export Association," and decided to send a representative to Europe, sailing on May 10, to secure orders under the Canadian credits. All firms in the line will be invited to join, and will share in the allocation of orders received. The Canadian Trades Commission is favoring special consideration of their case by the Canadian Mission in London, owing to the fact that through seasonal changes of fashion this industry invariably has five months in each year of virtual unemployment.

It was mentioned that owing to the large number of returning soldiers getting back into civilian clothes the men's garment trade throughout Canada was at the height of production. The Ladies' Wear Export Association holds large options on cloth, and is in a position to deal promptly with credit orders. Members were in accord with the Trade Commission that the present opportunities for entering the permanent export trade will not recur.
