ARE GETTING AFTER THE STONE THROWERS

Winnipeg Police Active in Subduing Trouble Makers.

NOYES, Minn., June 5. —

Deputy Chief of Police Newton has taken personal charge of the police flying squad detailed to put an end to the stoning of automobiles traversing the foreign sections of Winnipeg. No arrests have been made in connection with the rioting of Monday. On Arlington street, between Selkirk and Mountain avenues, there were large gatherings of foreigners, for the most part apparently interested in watching for a repetition of Monday's attacks on passing cars. The first car which came into view was that of the deputy chief and it had a dampening effect upon whatever rock-heaving ardor existed.

While entering a club cafe on Portage avenue, where she is em-

ployed, a young woman, who refused to divulge her name, was grabbed by one arm by a striker named Henry, an Austrian, formerly em-"scab," and tried to keep her from the doorway. When she resisted he struck her. Bystanders quickly interfered and beat "Henry" off while the woman sought safety. C. R. Lewis, proprietor of the cafe, said that before the strike he had 22 men in his employ, of whom 20 were Austrians. All the Austrians walked out when the strike was called. "I have been forced to employ these aliens." he said, "on account of the shortage of help, but hereafter my place will employ only Canadians," Railway Men Return. The freight sheds at the C.N.R.
