ASKS UNIONS TO RENOUNCE REDS

President of Manufacturers Says British, Not Russian, System Needed

TORONTO, June 11 .- If the Canadian Manufacturers' association this country is to retain confidence in organized labor, the trades and labor unions will have to denounce any of their members who hold and preach seditious doctrines repugnant to the common-sense of the Canadian people, said W. Bulman, of Winnipeg, president of the Canadian Manufacturers' association, in the course of his address at the 48th annual meeting of the association which opened here Tuesday. The president said that while the final result of negotiations between employers and employes had been satisfactory, extreme elements of revolutionary methods and speeches had made their appearance where they were hard to deal with. "The manufacturers' association does not take the view that the Canadian industrial system is perfect," said the president, "but prefers to improve unsatisfactory conditions by the British, not the Russian, way." Tariff revision is needed in the view of the association and the president advocated the appointment of a tariff revision of seven properly qualified men acting in an advisory capacity to parliament to make a thoroughly scientific investigation and recommendations for revision.
