Says Nabbed Aliens Won't Have Trial

A. J. Andrews Declares Men Will Be Deported Summarily

Six men arrested Friday as alien enemies on charges of seditious conspiracy will be deported without a trial as soon as arrangements are completed by immigration authorities, A. J. Andrews, K.C., special prosecutor for the Dominion government, announced today.

The men were rounded up Friday afternoon by Royal Northwest Mounted Police. They were sent immediately to Kingston penitentiary, Kingston, Ont., whence they will go to an interment camp in Ontario.

Officials refuse to divulge the names of the prisoners.

According to Mr. Andrews the arrest of alien enemies automatically gives the authorities the right to deport them without trial.

The arrests of Friday brought to 18 the total of men apprehended under authority of the amendment to the Immigration act.

The six English speaking strike leaders released from Stony Mountain on bail are to be arraigned in central police court Wednesday.

"Say to labor men that, when the trials are held, they, together with the general public will be placed in possession of facts that will cause every honest Canadian citizen to experience the indignation felt by Winnipeg citizens who suddenly found themselves under the soviet government," Hon. Gidean Robertson, minister of labor, declared when told of the dispatch from Toronto in which the labor council demanded his resignation for the summary arrest of the strike leaders.

"They are jumping at conclusions,"

Mr. Robertson said.
