MUST ANSWER OR REMAIN IN JAIL

Deadlock Reached in Winnipeg
Inquiry Owing to Continued
Refusal of Aliens to Give
Information.

WINNIPEG, July 18.—Martin Charitonoff, Oscar Schopplerei, Solomon P. Almazoff and Sam Blumenberg, held for breach of the Immigration Act, will appeal the decision of the board of inquiry, if the board orders their deportation, Marcus Hyman, their counsel, announced.

"The board will allow each of the men to appeal from its decision," Magistrate Noble, chairman, declared.

According to Magistrate Noble, power of appeal is left to the discretion of the board under the clause of the Immigration Act, which the men are alleged to have violated.

The decision of the board can be repealed by Hon. J. A. Calder, minister of immigration and colonization. The magistrate said that Mr. Calder's

decision would be final.

When the board met yesterday afternoon Mr. Hymans, E. J. McMurray and Mr. Murray, counsel for the aliens, announced that their policy was unchanged.

"We must object to certain questions asked by Mr. Andrews," they

told Magistrate Noble.

The magistrate said that the men would be held in custody until they

decided to answer the questions.

The Royal Northwest Mounted Police have a warrant for the arrest of two more men for alleged breach of the Immigration Act. One of them is said to be John Fischer, alleged to be a member of a local radical Socialist club. Fischer, it is understood, is wanted on a joint charge with Almazoff.
