MAGRATH MEN ARE FINED FOR AIDING ALIEN TO ESCAPE

Wocknitz and Leismeister Are Found Guilly in Supreme Court—Judge Lenient

For alding in the escape of one Genuschke, a prisoner of war of German nationally, T. Wocknitz and G. L'esmeister, farmers of Magrath, were this morning sentenced by Mr. Jus-

tice Hyndman, at the supreme court, to a line of \$150 and \$100, sespectively, to be paid forthwith or in lieu of the same, 30 days' imprisonment.

In delivering sentence, his fordship sald that he took a lentent view in the fact that both men were industrious farmers. He did not believe the statements of the accused that they were not aware that the man Genuschke, who was an their premtace, was not the man the police nanted when they made their visit. He felt that they distinctly evaded the questions of the police and will fully deceived them in seeking to hide from them the wherealouts of Gendschke. It may be only human that the prisoners should have sought to belp one of their own actionality in that blood is thicker than water, but this did not excuse them as they should remember that widle they fixed under the British flag they had to respect the laws of tite country.
