TO RELEASE UKRAINIANS

Have Been Interned Since May of 1917

Ottawa, October 10.—The Department of Justice has given instructions for the immediate release of the 17 Ukrainians and Poles who had been arrested, in Ottawa, in May, 1918, and interned fellowing a meeting of these aliens which had been considered unlawful.

A few days ago a delegation com-

posed of Mr. Auguste Lemieux, K. C., counsel for the Ukrainians, Ottawa, and M. Chopowik, and P. Yakubowski, called on Hon. C. J. Doherty, the Minister of Justice, and petitioned the Government for the release of these 17 Ukrainians and Poles. They represented that they were innocent of the charges preferred against them and that the orderin-council forbidding the meeting which they had attended had been passed in September, 1918, four months after the meeting. It was also reported that they had been interned without trial and that during their detention at Kapuskasing Camp, their families had suffered hardships and privations through their bread-winners being imprisoned.
