MOUNTED POLICE NOW NUMBER 1,800 New Federal Organization

Ottawa, Dec. 4.—The amalgamation of the Royal North-West Mounted Police and the Dominion Police Force, under the name of the Royal Can-adian Mounted Police, which was authorized by an Act passed at the last

session of Parliament, will be com-pleted within a week or ten days by a proclamation by the Governor-General in-Council. With the passage of the order-in-Council executive control of the police force will be centralised at Ottawa. The Royal North-West Mounted Police have been gradually

growing in strength. Enlistments for overseas military service reduced the numbers of the force, which, in May last, stood at about 500. The strength has now risen again to 1,800. This Autumn a new post was opened at Barnard Harbor, on Coronation Gulf.
