KAPUSKASING BOARD' MEETS New Commission Receives G.A.C.

Deputation-Soldier Cases. The commission appointed by the Ontario Government to inquire into

conditions at Kapuskasing held a preliminary session in Queen's Park to-day. All the members were pre-

sent, W. F. Nickle and Col. J. R. McLaren and Prof. Sharp. A deputation from the Grand Army of Canada waited on the commission, and presented the cases of several sol-

diers who desired improved conditions at Kapuskasing. The commission was still in session at two o'clock this afternoon. The commission will hold its first regular sessions on Monday and

Tuesday of next' week and will probably leave for North Ontario on Tuesday night. The commission will take evidence in the north, and complete its report. The power of the commission, Premier Drury stated to-day, extends

only to investigating conditions at Kapuskasing and to making recommendations to the Government. "There was bound to be objection taken to the report which Col. Carmichael submitted on Kapuskasing."

said the Premier. "So we have de-

cided to obtain a report to which no objection can be taken. The com-

mission will have power to make

recommendations in the case of every individual soldier, if it

chooses."
