

EXPECT LENGTHY TAX DISCUSSION

House To-day Will Take Up Resolution Paragraph by Paragraph

Ottawa, June 13.—The House tomorrow will discuss, paragraph by paragraph, the luxury tax resolutions, and will then take up the amendments of which the Minister of Finance has given notice. When formally moved, the amendments will come into force; for the time being, the luxury taxes originally proposed in the Budget speech remain law. The discussion on the taxes is expected to be somewhat protracted, and will no doubt lead to the suggestion of amendments apart from those which Sir Henry Drayton himself intends to move.

Following discussion of the luxury taxes, the House will consider the estimates of the Naval, Health and Militia Departments. In presenting the naval estimates, Hon. C. C. Balantyne, Minister of Naval Service, will outline the work of the department, its scope and the immediate program. Reports that he proposes to indicate anything like a permanent naval policy are stated to be without foundation.

It is probable that, during the week, the Minister of Justice will bring down his bill to amend the Naturalization Act. The bill seeks to remedy a situation caused by a provision in the Naturalization Act of last year, which barred from naturalization for 10 years after the war all of alien enemy birth. The provision has worked hardship in the case of certain residents in Canada. The bill proposes to modify it by empowering the Secretary of State to issue naturalization certificates to those of alien enemy birth against whom there is no complaint and who have already resided in Canada for at least 10 years.

A motion of which Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux has given notice is also likely to bring into the arena of discussion the resignation of Judge Robson from the Chairmanship of the Board of Commerce. The motion calls for the production of all correspondence in connection with the resignation.
